1. COURSE INFORMATION AND FEES

- **1.1** The PEI will deliver the Course as set out in <u>Schedule A</u> to the Student, towards conferment of the stated qualification upon successful Course completion.
- **1.2** The PEI confirms that the Course has been permitted by the Council for Private Education (CPE) and no amendments have been made to the Course as set out in <u>Schedule A</u>, unless otherwise permitted by CPE.
- **1.3** The Course Fees payable are set out in <u>Schedule B</u> and the optional Miscellaneous Fees in Schedule C.
- 1.4 The PEI considers payment made _____ days/month* after the scheduled due date(s) in <u>Schedule B</u> as late. The PEI will explain to the Student its policy for late payment of Course Fees, including any late payment fee charged in <u>Schedule C</u> (if applicable) and any impact on Course/module completion (if applicable).

2. REFUND POLICY

2.1 Refund for Withdrawal Due to Non-Delivery of Course:

The PEI will notify the Student within three (3) working days upon knowledge of any of the following:

- (iv) It terminates the Course before the Course Completion Date;
- (v) It has not ensured that the Student meets the course entry or matriculation requirement as set by the organisation stated in <u>Schedule A</u> within any stipulated timeline set by CPE; or

The Student should be informed in writing of alternative study arrangements (if any), and also be entitled to a refund of the entire Course Fees and Miscellaneous Fees already paid should the Student decide to withdraw, within seven (7) working days of the above notice.

2.2 Refund for Withdrawal Due to Other Reasons:

If the Student withdraws from the Course for any reason other than those stated in Clause 2.1, the PEI will, within seven (7) working days of receiving the Student's written notice of withdrawal, refund to the Student an amount based on the table in Schedule D.

2.3 Refund During Cooling-Off Period:

The PEI will provide the Student with <u>a cooling-off period of seven (7) working days</u> after the date that the Contract has been signed by both parties.

The Student will be refunded the highest percentage (stated in <u>Schedule D</u>) of the fees already paid if the Student submits a written notice of withdrawal to the PEI within the cooling-off period, regardless of whether the Student has started the course or not.

3. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- **3.1** The laws of Singapore will apply to how this Contract will be read and to the rights the parties have under this Contract.
- **3.2** If any part of this Contract is not valid for any reason under the law of Singapore, this will not affect any other part of this Contract.
- 3.3 If the Student and the PEI cannot settle a dispute using the way arranged by the PEI, the Student and the PEI may refer the dispute to the CPE Mediation-Arbitration Scheme (www.cpe.gov.sg).
- 3.4 All information given by the Student to the PEI will not be given by the PEI to anyone else, unless the Student signs in writing that he agrees or unless the PEI is allowed to give the information by law.
- 3.5 Any agreement other than this Contract is invalid if it is administered without the written permission of CPE. If there is any other agreement between the PEI and the Student that is different from the terms in this Contract, then the terms in this Contract will apply.
- 3.6 If the Student or the PEI does not exercise or delay exercising any right granted by this Contract, the Student and the PEI will still be able to exercise the same type of right under this Contract during the rest of the time the Contract continues.
- 3.7 If this Contract is also signed or translated in any language other than English and there is a difference from the English language copy of this Contract, the English language copy will apply.

Course Schedule With Modules and/or Subjects

Introduction

The Visual and Performing Arts Curriculum uses the medium of the arts to allow children — all children — can express themselves in ways that are not possible in words. It is this belief in the power of the arts that has allowed us to design a curriculum that is sensory in nature — a curriculum in which the arts are explored and used educationally, instrumentally and therapeutically to maximize sensory experience, development and learning across all curriculum areas.

Visual and Performing Arts

LITERACY

Communication between people is essential to the development and maintenance of daily life. Language plays an essential role in learning, thinking, remembering and reasoning, and if impaired is likely to have significant effects on listening, speaking, reading and writing.

Communicative functions can be conveyed using a variety of forms, including vocalisation, facial expressions, gestures and body movements. Effective strategies to develop the underlying aspects of language and communication include speech, signing, symbols and the use of augmentative and alternative communication aids.

NUMERACY

The Mathematics curriculum has been developed to allow students to acquire skills and knowledge in order to cope with daily life as competently and confidently as they are able. At all levels teachers draw on the students understanding of their world, to ensure that abstract ideas are linked to the familiar.

GENERAL STUDIES

The General Studies curriculum has two strands

- □ Self and Relationships
- □ Daily Living

These have been developed to meet the specific and special needs of the students at Port Phillip Specialist School.

The strands incorporate the Key Learning Areas of Health, SOSE, Science and Technology, which are delivered within the framework of the Visual and Performing Arts.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Learning in the Physical Education area assists students to develop the knowledge and skills that promote participation in physical activity, fitness and effective relationships. Students will develop an understanding of the basic concepts of movement and will be involved as participants in play, games, dance, aquatics, sport, outdoor activities, leisure and recreation. Many will react and respond appropriately to physical activities that have rules and participate in modified sports, which demand more refined movement patterns and participant interaction. They will develop their bike riding skills and will be exposed to a range of play situations, equipment and playing areas that are modified according to ability, while learning to cooperate and participate with others. They will participate in activities that promote cardiovascular endurance, flexibility and strength. Students will take an active part in environments that support health and participation in physical activity.

VISUAL and PERFORMING ARTS

Collectively the Visual and Performing Arts represent a powerful language of expression that enhances the learning process.

Whilst there are areas of commonality across the Arts modalities, there are also areas that are unique.

Areas of commonality might include: listening, selecting, participating, composing, arranging, improvising, designing, displaying, performing, analysing and adapting. More specifically examples might include:
